A big thank you to all of the PTFA for their well thought out sustainable Christmas fair. It was fantastic to see how they have worked so hard to ensure that our fair could be as eco conscious as possible.

Here are some of the things they considered and made happen.

ECO SWAPS FROM PTFA:

- We swapped out latex balloons for foil balloons, they last longer and can be recycled at your local super market.
 - The soaps were home made by our PTFA.
- We asked for pre loved toys, jumpers clothes etc to promote re-using.
- We recycled as much as possible, the plastic cups were recyclable too.
- Santa's elves wrapped the Santa's grotto gifts in recycled wrapping paper (on the way from the north pole!).
- The glow sticks were not single-use, they contain batteries and can be reused over and over again.
- We borrowed rather than bought the Santa's grotto décor.
- Tombola items were from families' own cupboards.
- We avoided cellophane for sweet bags and reindeer food and used paper instead.
- Splat the Rat was made from a futon, the rat and thickened cardboard baton was made by PTFA!
- Wooden Christmas signs were made from pallet wood
- Lucky dip tree-made at home using scrap store bits and the toys inside are preloved donations from PTFA.
- Any plastic pockets were re used over and over again, not binned!
- Families, were encouraged to use the recycle bins to help us teach the children to recycle.

We also made important decisions about our delivery at the Carol Service.





Year 3 are loving our new history topic about the stone age.

We've learnt a lot about pre history, early stone age and what life would have looked like.

This week we learnt about cave paintings/ drawings and got to add our own cave drawing to our progressive fact file that we have been creating over the past few weeks.







This week, Year 6 have had a lot of fun experimenting with charcoal to create depth and texture in their artwork. This was inspired by the artist Kathe Kollwitz who we have been exploring as a year group in our art lessons this half term. We had a lot of fun discovering the different uses of charcoal and even ended up getting a little bit messy! We will use the skills developed in this lesson to inform our final pieces which we will be creating at the end of this half term.



















Year 4 had great fun on their trip to the Energy from Waste plant in Plymouth learning some incredible facts about what happens to our waste and how to reduce our waste by reducing, reusing and recycling (the 3 R's). We learned that an amazing 245,000 tonnes of waste is delivered to the plant every year and that the waste burns in the combustion chamber at temperatures higher than 1,000 - hotter than lava!
